Course Description and Objectives: Oliver Wendell Holmes famously said that "Taxes are what we pay for civilized society," but who should pay and how much? In this course, we will develop the interdisciplinary tools of policy analysis to engage in several current debates in tax policy at the local, state, federal, and international levels.

As a Policy Seminar, our emphasis will be on written and oral communication skills, teamwork, and discussion. My goal for this course is *not* to turn students into experts on tax policy. Rather, we will use tax policy topics as fodder to hone our analytical thinking, communication strategies, and other skills that are essential to the public policy profession.

Our goals for this course include:

- Exploring some of the philosophical and theoretical perspectives used to justify tax policies and understanding the fundamental role tax policy plays in democratic governance
- Applying the tools of policy analysis to current tax policy debates
- Developing skills to critically evaluate the arguments of others
- Improving policy writing skills in multiple formats
- Practicing playing different roles in oral policy discussions, presentations, and debates

Format, Grading, and Assignments:

The format of the class is a mixture of traditional lecture-style sessions and student-led structured debates. The debates will give us the opportunity to apply some of the concepts and tools we develop during lectures to tax policy issues currently being debated at all levels of government. Students will be assigned to teams, and each team will be assigned a different role for each debate. Detailed role and assignment descriptions will be posted on Canvas.

The main individual project for the semester will be the development of a 15-20 page "white paper" on a tax policy topic of your choice. The white paper will require you to do outside research on your topic and develop a detailed analysis and policy recommendation. Two rounds of peer editing will give students the opportunity to critique others' arguments and incorporate feedback to improve their own papers. Details and due dates will be posted on Canvas.
