Course Description

The Ford School of Public Policy's Ph.D. seminar is a year-long required course for first and second year students in the joint Ph.D. program. The course is intended to provide opportunities for professional development, cohort building, and interdisciplinary learning/interactions across the three participating disciplines of economics, political science and sociology. The course meets for 1.5 hours, seven times per semester. During the fall semester, students will read working papers written by Ford School faculty. Teams of students from multiple disciplines will be assigned to discuss and facilitate class discussions on each paper. During the winter semester, advanced Ph.D. students will present their job market papers, with teams of students from the class again serving as discussants and discussion leaders.

Assignments: Each student will be assigned as a discussant for one paper per semester. For those sessions, students are responsible for working with their co-discussant to develop a set of comments and questions/discussion points, to be submitted in writing 24 hours before the class. Students not assigned as discussants on a given paper are required to submit at least one question for the author to an online site prior to the class.

Grading: Grading will be based on attendance, participation, and written comments for the two assigned papers.
